#3 District Response Unit EVIDENCE BASED POLICING AND VISION ZERO

- Harm reduction focused on increased enforcement, Pedestrian Safety, Community engagement and MAS
- Increased enforcement has resulted in a 46 % increase in non-criminal charges laid over 2023. 10 % increase in impaired charges.
- 25 % increase in cell-phone PON's issued in 2024
- MAS tests (946) increased by 15 % in 2024.
- Participated in over 20 planned protests



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#3 District Criminal Investigations Bureau


- Clearance rates are down 4%
- Started a dedicated Risk Mitigation Team, and are utilizing Officers on modified duties in an effort to increase our clearance rates.
- The number of 914's is exactly the same as last year. A trend just emerging in 3 District is a steep decline in reprogramming type thefts. Now back to more traditional methods.
- Sextortions are on the rise but not at the same rate as 2023.

- Unhoused persons in Burlington are greatly affecting so called petty crime, resulting in much crime higher rates in these categories
- Large scale investigations are still a drain on resources. There may be a decline in this as Major Crime are now starting to take over attempt homicides and suspicious missing persons.









